# Understanding Parametric Weather Insurance



Parametric weather insurance is a specialized form of weather insurance designed to help businesses protect against revenue losses from precipitation during specific times and dates. Unlike traditional indemnity policies, parametric weather insurance pays out automatically when rainfall—or any frozen precipitation including snow, hail, ice, graupel, etc. (measured as frozen precipitation melted equivalent)—exceeds a preselected threshold, eliminating the need for claims paperwork or documentation of losses.

Policies are built around key elements including the date and time of coverage, a rainfall or other frozen precipitation trigger (such as 0.25" during the covered period), and the payout amount. If the measured precipitation (rain or melted snow/ice/etc.) exceeds the trigger during the insured window, the payout is issued—typically within two weeks without the need to cancel the event or provide proof of loss.

This solution is ideal for a wide range of industries and events that rely heavily on cooperative outdoor conditions: festivals, concerts, seasonal attractions, holiday markets, and corporate gatherings. These policies are highly customizable, enabling clients to insure specific hours or dates and select their precipitation thresholds based on historical climate trends and event sensitivity.

# Winter and Holiday Vulnerabilities

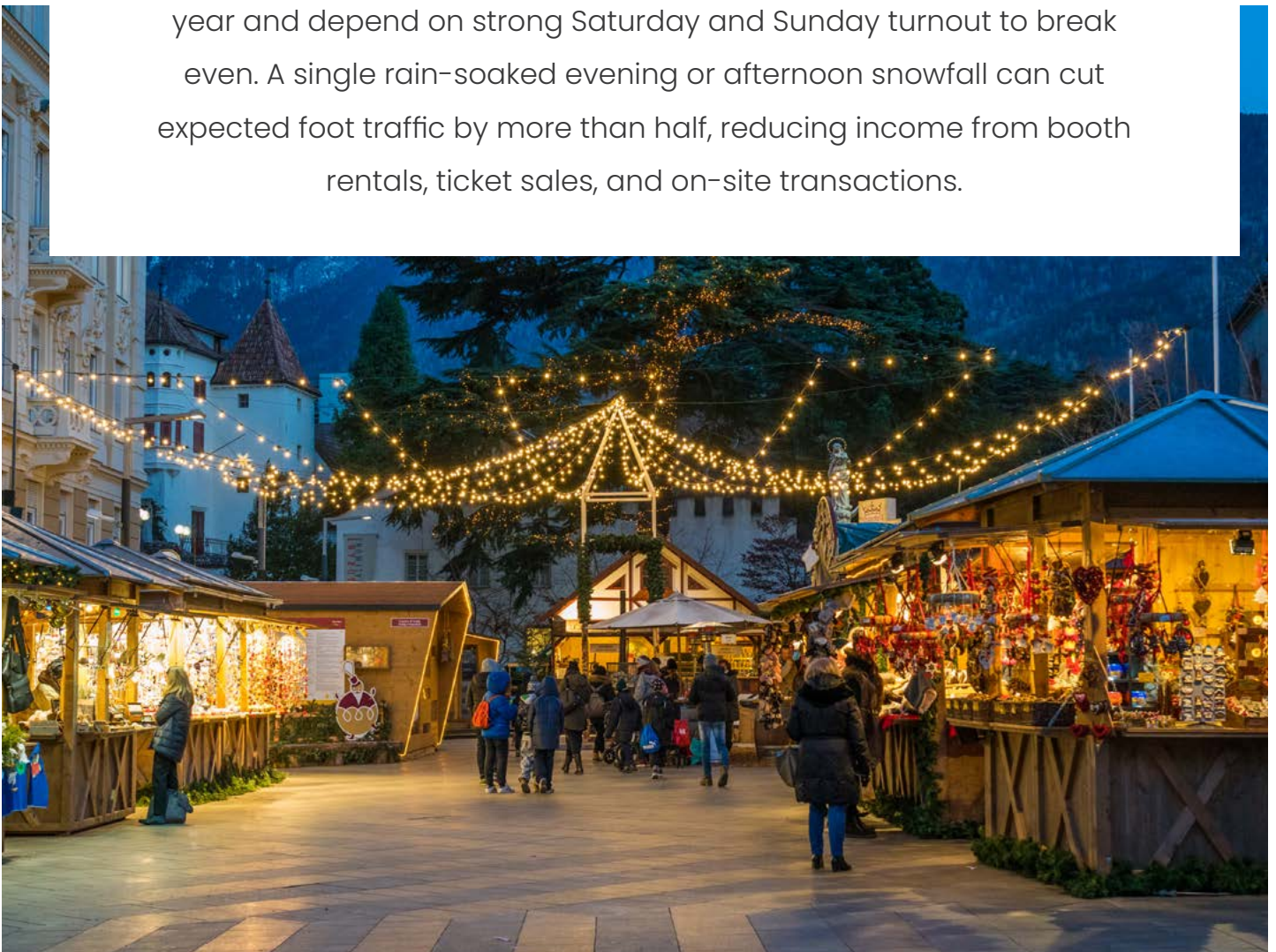
Winter and holiday events are uniquely susceptible to precipitation. Cold, wet conditions often deter attendance, particularly for outdoor venues where at least dry conditions are essential for drawing and retaining crowds. Even light precipitation during prime event hours can drastically reduce walk-up ticket sales, merchandise purchases, and concessions revenue.

Event organizers and businesses face the challenge of fixed operational costs regardless of turnout. Vendors, performers, security, staffing, and logistics remain scheduled and paid even when the weather suppresses attendance. Parametric weather insurance offers a solution that bridges this financial exposure.



# Real-World Winter Precipitation Scenarios

Holiday markets, for instance, often run for just a few weekends each year and depend on strong Saturday and Sunday turnout to break even. A single rain-soaked evening or afternoon snowfall can cut expected foot traffic by more than half, reducing income from booth rentals, ticket sales, and on-site transactions.



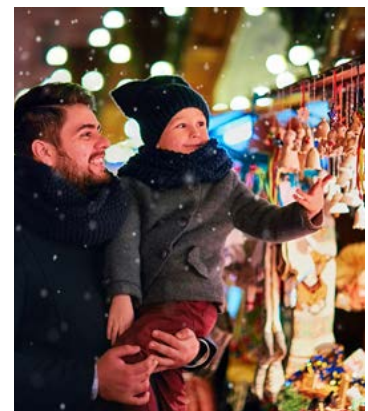
# Real-World Winter Precipitation Scenarios

*Another example is a haunted Halloween trail or Christmas walk-through attraction that opens only on weekends through November and December. One night of poor weather (misty rain or a persistent light snowfall) can represent 10–20% of seasonal revenue. Parametric weather insurance helps safeguard profitability, especially when rescheduling is not an option.*



*Similarly, a winter lights festival or tree-lighting ceremony may only operate one night. Rain in that narrow window could lead to significant financial disappointment. With parametric weather insurance, the event sponsor can secure a payout that offsets lost revenue and covers sunk costs such as sound equipment, electricity costs, food vendors, and security.*

*Consider a community that plans a weekend-long holiday market expected to generate \$250,000 in revenue. A well-timed precipitation insurance policy with a 0.25" threshold (the client chooses the rainfall threshold) during Saturday evening hours could recoup, for example, \$100,000 (the client chooses the limit) in lost revenue if the recorded precipitation meets or exceeds the 0.25" policy threshold, helping organizers meet budget obligations and plan for future years.*



# How Coverage Works



**Coverage is highly customizable and defined by:**

- ✓ **SPECIFIC LOCATION**
- ✓ **COVERAGE WINDOW**
- ✓ **PRECIPITATION TRIGGER**  
(any measurable precipitation can trigger the policy)

depending on how sensitive their event is to the weather. In terms of snowfall, even a light dusting of snow can mean a payout if its melted equivalent (as low as 0.01") meets the preselected threshold. Coverage can be structured to cover expected revenue, expenses, or a defined percentage of anticipated losses.

Policies must be bound at least 15 days before the event date, and the claims process is simple. Once triggered, payouts are processed rapidly, helping clients maintain cash flow even when events underperform due to weather.

# Strategic Benefits for Brokers and Clients

Parametric weather insurance provides a compelling opportunity for brokers to offer tailored risk management solutions, especially during the winter months when weather unpredictability is high.
